Anyway some time passed and then I'd say it was around fall when I started thinking about Dusty again. I listened to more of Golden Hits, and I found the VHS (1999, remember...) of Full Circle. And then I started doing some research online about Dusty's career and herself as a person. Especially on one website where I met a certain man whose emails and friendship helped me a great deal as well (sidenote: unfortunately I wound up no longer friends with this person, but if given the chance I wish I could have/could patch things up somehow). He also made several Dusty mix tapes for me, which got me familiar with more and more of the great work she did over her 30+ year career. Then I found the egroup "Dustymail" and that started putting things into overdrive. 
