Re: "DON'T SAY IT BABY"

This song/record came about via Charlie Koppelman and Don Rubin who had recently taken up managerial positions at Big 7 Music - the publishing wing of Roulette Records. We were invited over to pitch our latest song and were informed that Dusty was coming up for a session and needed material.

Back at the office we began to toss some ideas around. I was in love with The Beach Boys, "DON'T WORRY BABY" and began playing its chord changes. Chip, as he often did, set the lyric direction and in this case the ricocheted title.

At that point in time, the finshed lyrics would have been

more male-oriented appropriate...but we liked the song's attitude of independence that spoke to the subtle edge that seeped through in Dusty's music.

We called Jean Thomas to do the original demo...and as it turned out she is also heard as background singer on Dusty's record.

In my mind, to have Dusty record your song was an artistic coup...above all else. For me, she was firmly in 1st place among the blue-eyed female exponents of soul and with a breathtaking range that ran from "CAN I GET A WITNESS" to "THE WINDMILLS OF YOUR MIND" without ever hitting an inauthentic note.
