I think the announcement at the Brits in 1998 shocked a lot of people, I know it did me. The strange thing was I mentioned this to Pat a while ago and she said Dusty was never due to be there. Whether she was or she wasn't (and one newspaper said she was due to present an award), the announcement of her illness made all the papers the next day.

THE Brit awards ceremony was silenced last night when the audience was told that Dusty Springfield was very ill with cancer.

Presenter Ben Elton said: "The BPI had hoped that Dusty Springfield, that icon of music, would be here tonight. Sadly, her management have asked us to convey her apologies and said that she's very ill and battling against cancer.

"So I know everybody in the industry will send Dusty our love and our very best wishes."


Ben Elton presented the Brits in both 1997 and 1998. Carole, your recollection that it was in 1998 that Dusty was due to present an award ties in with material I have found in copies of DSB. Also, your recollection of what Elton said about Dusty tallies with mine, ie he said that Dusty was to have presented the next award but was too ill to attend and asked the audience to keep Dusty in their thoughts.

A DSB member wrote to the BPI, which organises the Brit Awards, to ask if they would make a posthumous award to mark Dusty's contribution to British music. The response was negative. Their rationale was that the 'outstanding contribution' award was usually the last to be announced on the evening and was usually supported by a 'show-stopping performance' by the recipient. They went on to say that an award accompanied by footage of a late performer was not appropriate in that sort of show.

The full text of the BPI's letter is in DSB 46.

One other thing I recently noticed. While watching the DVD's I thought her image might confuse those who are not already fans. Here she is an attractive young woman in those floor length gowns on the videos. She looks like a classy prom queen. Then that powerful soulful voice comes out and for some it doesn't fit. Again, marketing her image might help. I see kids wearing Bob Marley and Johnny Cash shirts and often they don't have a clue about their music. Instead, the have been taught that these icons are cool. Dusty did a lot of cool things in her career, too, but I would have never known had DWD not touched upon them. Why are the U.K. publications not doing cover stories on her? Are they saying her career accomplishments are not on a par with Pattie Smith, Janis, Kate Bush, and Madonna? All of these women have had cover stories in the U.K. publications. Why has Dusty only managed a few pages every couple of years? I do agree with you, Maggie as far as it being a mystery about her lack of attention.

The difference is that those mentioned (except Elvis, who died of an intestinal obstruction) lived, and died, in the same trajectory so it wasn't a surprise. Dusty's image in life was more mainstream and therefore the revelations about her life were more of a shock, so much so as to create two Dusty's - the one we though she was and the one we later found out about.

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You are right about the image projected, especially in her BBC shows, being at odds with most of her music, but it was an attractive, becoming image that allowed her to veer crazily from belting out a show tune to a Motown raver.

There is no question that women singers have always been marginalized, and Dusty was so hard to categorize that only those who have studied her music realize how great she was. Everyone else seems to regard her, and dismiss her, as a "Pop Princess".

The only way to change that is for more people in the industry to immerse themselves in her recordings, but my original point was that the sentiment seems to be "Why bother? She was a success who crashed and burned long ago". This sort of dismissal wouldn't be the case, I believe, if Dusty's life had been told accurately.

I don't believe that DWD has any impact on Dusty not receiving any sort of recognition at the Brits. Apart from the Bret rubbish, which I never even saw reviewed, the other books have been mainly about the music with just a nod to the personal stuff. There have been far worse books

written about umpteem musicians as is said above. I do think that she is viewed very differently in this country than in the States and for a singer whose main career was in the sixties and who died nearly 13 years ago, her name still appears regularly in articles and reviews as someone to aspire to. Adele is often named in articles as "the best British female singer since Dusty Springfield".
