I have often thought that their lead singer, Russell Thomkins, reminded me of Dusty with his falsetto. After playing this record I followed with the vinyl edition of "Brand New Me." I couldn't help but notice how similiar the production was on these two and then realized that Thom Bell was connected to both. I remember reading an interview with him and he talked a little about Dusty. He said he didn't blame Gamble and Huff for going after Dusty to produce since she was so talented. He said she was a nice lady, but felt she should have trusted her instincts more. This was regarding some of the songs on BNM. Bell felt many of the songs sounded too much alike and that she knew this but was reluctant to say anything. I really like this album, but I tend to agree the songs are not as strong as DIM. The production sounds good; I love the

I did a little checking and it seems Bell pretty much controlled the the group and knew the strength was the voice of Thomkins. Bell hooked up with them around 1968-69 which I believe was around the time she recording BNM. I wonder if Dusty's vocals influenced Thompkins or vice versa or was this just a coincidence. I thought I read that she opened for them in Vegas and that they were friends. They had some really good songs and I wonder what might have happened if she had let Bell produce her. It's a mystery why she wasn't highly regarded here in the states as a soul singer. The Memphis album and BNM should have proved how good she was at this. Does anyone else hear a similarity between Dusty and the Stylistics? Maybe she was just ahead of her time, or I'm grasping at straws. What do y'all think?

As a result, I can hear something by the Stylistics, like "Stop, Look, Listen (to Your Heart)", or the Delfonics "Didn't I (Blow Your Mind This Time)", and find the artistic thread that joins them to Dusty.

It's a shame Dusty couldn't have held on at Atlantic a bit longer- I think if she had worked with Bell again circa 1973, when Thom had probably his most prolific period producing The Spinners ("I'll Be Around", "Could it Be I'm Falling in Love", "Then Came You"), the result would've been explosive. He's also on record saying he had a great time working with Dusty... \bigcirc
