The reason I ask is due to some things I've read over the last year or so; some remarks have been in print while others have been in blogs, etc. I sometimes get the feeling that with Adele's massive success, and she has earned it, that in the near future it will be she rather than Dusty by which female singers, especially, in the U.K., are judged. I've read several things in print already saying she is the best to come out of Britain. Now this may have do to with the age of the person writing it, but since Dusty does not get much print here in the U.S. and Adele is so well known here Dusty may never get the recognition here she deserves.

With the recent publicity over Burt Bacharach's book and the hits created with Hal David for Dionne Warwick there seems to be more interest in her career. I did not know she nor Burt and Hal were not in the R&RHOF. At least that's what I've read. I think all three are deserving. However, there seems to be this idea that Dusty was nothing more than a second rate Dionne. One article said Dusty's accomplishments paled next to Dionne's and if someone like DS could be inducted than Dionne should be, too. This was from a magazine on collecting records. It mentioned only Dionne's chart placing here in the U.S. compared the Dusty. It also went on to say Dusty had two styles of singing: bombastic or breathy. Today I read a review of a new collection of Burt's work. The complaint was that the best version of songs was not included. Two examples were given. The first said instead of using our Cilla's version of Alfie Barbara Streisand's was used. The second complained of Dusty sobbing her way through Twenty Four Hours From Tulsa instead of using the version by Gene Pitney. This was from a U.K. publication.

I don't mean this as a put down of either Adele or Dionne. I'm a fan of both. However, just as there has been a backlash against the Beatles by some critics I wonder if the same will happen to DS. It would be a shame if she fell out of favor especially since the 15th anniversary of her death is coming up. I had hoped that date would bring renewed recognition. So what do you think? Am I being paranoid or is she starting to get lost with time?
