I agree with Carole G. I think Dusty's death has allowed her to be reclaimed and promoted as a Great. This started as early as the obituaries in the days after her death. Dusty's amazing profile this year marks her out as extraordinary and special.

We've been educated now so we realise and acknowledge Dusty's greatness even if we are not die-hard fans. Dusty is being reconstructed and brought back to us as she was in her greatest years - the 1960s. [Meanwhile the importance of DWD has dwindled in comparison]. It's been interesting to watch this. That's down to the books and documentaries and DVDs and Tarentino's 'Pulp Fiction'. And maybe Dusty did herself a favour by selling her catalogue royalties to Prudential - maybe they've been helping to stimulate all that repackaging of Dusty's hits that helps keeps her profile current inlouding the inclusion on Pulp Fiction?.

Time is on Dusty's side. Women are heavily involved in keeping Dusty up where she belongs and relevant to our times. That's a good sign of the times. The generation of music writers has shifted too in any case and it's now cool to admire and reference the fascinating and timeless Dusty. It's a progression from the 70s and 80s when it was hip to own a copy of 'Dusty in Memphis'.













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
