Dusty chose songs that speak to people. The words are always meaningful and timeless and this in part answers question 2. As she was a singer for so long, her choice of songs covers early love experiences and more mature experiences of love, longing, loss, resignation and reflection on life. This accompanies us on our journey through life and so Dusty's music is relevant to all ages.

To go back to question 1 for a minute after song selection (in order that is) comes Dusty's amazing voice, its power, its depth, its ability to speak right to you and its breathy vulnerability that seems to often echo our own as we go through life. Her interpretation of songs is amazing. I've heard songs that I previously didn't really like sung by Dusty that have blown me away.

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What are you Doing the Rest of Your Life and A House is Not a Home are examples of this. Her professionalism and insistence on getting songs just right have always been a trait that I admired.

In learning of Dusty's death, I felt a profound sense of loss, of an emptyness in the music industry that can never be filled and although it is not as strong as when I first heard of Dusty's death, I can still be overwhelmed when hearing her sing of just how much we have lost not only collectively, but also personally.



2. Why do you continue to love her music?


To me nobody can deliver like she did, the voice, the timing, the emotion, the intricacies. Ever song takes me on a journey.

Hi Will. I am usually at the back of the field...but hopefully it's not too late to comment..

1) From the moment I saw Dusty and heard her voice in the Springfields I was immediately hooked. She appeared to be like the "girl next door", but then over the years as she went solo her voice then transcended the look she had with Tom and Mike, although she still maintained a look of a fun looking person, and this still came to the fore in interviews.

- 2) I grew up with her music and was totally mesmerised by her voice and every song she sang. Her music developed as I developed, but it didn't matter what she sang, even the "Mother's Pride" advert, if you remember that (?!) she could do no wrong it was Dusty "The Whole Package", which was very appealing. I think once you have enjoyed seeing and listening to Dusty this continues; where Dusty is concerned taste does not change, the impact she has on each and every one of us just gets stronger and stronger, she is like a magnet.
- 3) I was extremely saddened by Dusty's death, she was the only artiste I had ever followed and it was the end of an era, and unfortunately for me I had lost contact with so many people that I kept my real feelings to myself. As I mentioned in a previous thread I was away on a 50th birthday "bash" with 7 others, I was on my own when I heard of Dusty's death on the radio and I told only my friend whose birthday it was, yes, I was embarrassed at the effect it had on me and played it down.
