I came across an article from 1999 by Peter Sheridan. What caught my eye was the remarks from Norma Tanega. Here is an excerpt:

WHEN Norma heard about Dusty's death from cancer last Tuesday at the age of 59, it was inevitable that her mind went back to that late Sixties day in the Granada studio.

From her home near Los Angeles, Norma said: 'I really loved her. I loved her up until the end. She was really a true friend, more like a sister to me.

That's how hard her death has hit me.

She was obviously a very important part of my life. She was a very gifted person, but she had a difficult life. It's unpleasant for anybody to have to deny their sexuality.

'Dusty was haunted by her own insecurities.

There was a vulnerability in her voice, and how she felt was one of the things that struck a chord with everyone and made her so loving.

'Her insecurities made her want to be perfectionist. Dusty had a great sense of humour about all of this. She'd say, "What about all those heterosexuals? It must be very unpleasant for them too, having to hide in the closet."

'But there are so many men who have to do that: singing songs about boy-girl love while their hearts are elsewhere.

Though I hadn't seen her in a while, I spoke to Dusty by phone, up until the end. She faced her illness the way she did everything else - very emotionally, which is how it was with her singing.

She'd be up, and then she'd be down.' In deference to Dusty, Norma draws a discreet veil over the more intimate details of their relationship, explaining: 'I must respect the way she was, not talking about it. Times have changed, but people still have to be careful of what they say

I always wondered if Norma left Dusty because she was trying to protect Dusty from the press finding out about their affair. It came under the heading "The love affairs with women that Dusty kept a secret from the world" and was one of many that appeared in the British press in the weeks after Dusty died. I never met Norma but those who have say she is very guarded and discreet about Dusty but happy to talk about the musical side. The press got hold of very little detail about Norma and Dusty being a couple back in the 60's and apart from the odd fan pic, I never saw pictures of them together. I was told that that was likely due to Mike Gill, Dusty's publicist back then, his job was to protect Dusty from the media's stories and he did that very, very well.
