Acclaimed by many as the best female pop singer to ever emerge out of Britain, Dusty Springfield has already become a legend through her four-decade career, genre versatility and numerous musical accomplishments. From her solo debut in the early 1960s she released twenty studio albums and countless memorable hits, which remain as appreciated today as they were when first becoming popular. She travelled extensively to promote her music, reaching

distant locations and popularising soul music in countries where it was practically unknown. Recognised as having a unique style, she had a great impact on other musicians and on the industry as a whole, being celebrated not only for the music itself and her assiduousness as a recording artist, but also for her charming personality, stylish appearance and energy, traits which lead to her status as an icon of the British pop scene.

Her career is seen as symbiotic with the decades it unfolded in, her music, attitude, the life philosophy she conveyed and her appearance being in tandem with the intense changes society was undergoing at the time. Despite the attempts of many to associate her image with the banal and frivolity, wishing to turn it into a symbol of glamour, music critics as well as her acquaintances and friends argue that brashness was simply the shield of a deep and complex personality, leaving the image as the mere mask of a public persona.

Pioneering soul music in Britain, she has led the way for countless female artists with a similar approach to music, developing her own style, which in spite of drawing inspiration from African American performers, was by no means an imitation or an attempt to fit into an ethnic background she did not belong to. She is known for her interest in civil liberties and social equality, issues which she was always outspoken about, in spite of the immediate consequences in a fluctuating and morally confused social environment. Unlike the moral speeches given by present day celebrities, who face no repercussions for their statements, her state was candid and sustained, sometimes resulting in perilous events such as her deportation from South Africa for suspicion of undermining the state policies of segregation.

Beyond all media coverage, official recognitions and praises for her prolific activity and role in the evolution of the UK music industry, <u>as well as the</u> <u>tactless public disclosure of her private life</u>, she remains in people's memory as a highly gifted, hard working, charming and sensitive person, who in spite of all struggles remained genuine until the end.

"She eventually became the best-selling female singer in the world and topped a number of popularity polls, including Melody Maker's Best International Vocalist. She was the first UK singer to top the New Musical Express readers' poll for Female Singer."

"Most responses to her voice emphasise her breathy sensuality. Another powerful feature was the sense of longing, in songs such as "I Just Don't Know What to Do with Myself" and "Goin' Back". The uniqueness of Springfield's voice was described by Bacharach: "You could hear just three notes and you knew it was Dusty". Wexler declared, "[h]er particular hallmark was a haunting sexual vulnerability in her voice, and she may have had the most impeccable intonation of any singer I ever heard". Greil Marcus of Rolling Stone captured Springfield's technique as "a soft, sensual box (voice) that allowed her to combine syllables until they turned into pure cream." She had a finely tuned musical ear and extraordinary control of tone. She sang in a variety of styles, mostly pop, soul, folk, Latin, and rock'n'roll. Being able to wrap her voice around difficult material, her repertoire included songs that their writers ordinarily would have offered to black vocalists. In the 1960s, on several occasions, she performed as the only white singer on all-black bills. Her soul orientation was so convincing that early in her solo career, US listeners who had only heard her music on radio or records sometimes assumed that she was African American. Later, a considerable number of critics observed that she sounded black and American or made a point of saying she did not."

Dusty was one of the sweetest persons I have ever met, without a single bone of malice or unkindness in her body. As a group, we then ran through the whole act, responding willingly to every one of Dusty's precise instructions, including dance step directions for Douggie and the boys, until our leader's previously-clouded face was beaming with contentment and pride. It all sounded tremendous; she had demolished most of what we had started out with and rebuilt the whole edifice from the bottom upwards in a minimum of time, and without ruffling a single feather. Yes. Dusty really knew her business.

Her appealing voice soared above the tumult like an eagle on the wing and the rest of us were sure of one thing. We were in the presence of greatness.
