I think you may be confusing two situations-

Howard was the man Dusty mentioned in a 1978 UK interview. This is the man mentioned in Lucy O'Brien's book, but another party is quoted as saying they recall Dusty briefly being involved in the late 70's with a manager named Howard. DWD mentions it briefly and sort of mocks Dusty for it, saying she further "confused matters" by making him up.

In 1981 in an interview on Australian TV Dusty mentions being involved with a musician from Canada (and I believed she said they were engaged). That may have been Carole Pope she was referring to...


