By the next edition of the bulletin though in November 1990 the news was that the album was unlikely to be

released in America.

By mid 1990 it had been 2 and a half years since WHIDTDT had been a big hit in the US.

Unlike in Europe Dusty hadn't had any hit singles since in the US charts.

Plus the PSBs own chart fortunes had taken a dive in the US by 89/90

Also the PSB -produced Liza Minelli album Results had only made number 128 in the US charts in 1989. Perhaps the American label saw *Reputation* as a similar product and were wary of putting it on the market.
