For instance, however slowly and meticulously she may have recorded the vocals for 'In Memphis', what emerged was as close to perfection as anyone else has ever reached. I guess the question is quantity or quality?

I think this is best answered by someone who has had the experience of seeing and hearing Dusty live a number of times. If she was equally capable of being consistent and emotionally invested in songs in an environment where there are no opportunities for re-takes, perhaps she could have sacrificed a little perfectionism for more of her good (by which I mean a higher quantity of recordings).

I've heard a few studio cuts that wern't the choice end vocal and she sang wonderfully, from beginning to end, not bit by bit. I think that only came to light with the PSB's when she lost confidence in her ability and they talked about her syllable by syllable recording. She sang 'Nothing Has Been Proved' on a TV awards show, pre recording it that day, and not until the very end did I realise it wasn't the actual record. She was a perfectionist, no doubt, but I believe she could be even more passionate singing live....even with the odd bum note.

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


