



I swore out loud with excitement when I saw this thread. THANK YOU! so very much for these photos, Nancy. The note and the album are valuable pieces of music history. I don't remember any quotes from these in the new books. I'm very grateful to be able to read them here. I look forward to Ralph's explanations and I hope he does post here.

It's a dream of mine that Dusty may have left something behind written in her own words about her music. I have never seen the Memphis note. The best singing I've done on record. It's a very good album. It's got KLASS. . Dusty says she was responsible for most of the song choices and for structuring the rhythm tracks. She was proud of this album just as Vicki Wickham told us. She knew she had made a great album. I presume therefore that it was the failure to sell (and the critics' later obsessive focus on it) that led Dusty to down play its greatness in public.

The white label album could be the Dusty in Memphis Plus re-release version as Carole says. This came out in 1980 so I guess this could be the date of the note too. Why, therefore, does Dusty say the album is out of print? If it is the Plus album it means Dusty didn't think much of the extra unnapproved for inclusion tracks: I Wanna Be A Free Girl, I Believe In You, What Do You Do When Love Dies; Haunted. They are GARBAGE - at least in comparison to the superb quality of Memphis.

I think Dusty just found the 'bloody awful' Windmills hard to get 'into some kind of cohesive pattern'. Dusty notes that track 2 side 2 has the 'best vocal quality'. That track is 'Windmills of Your Mind'. Given that this is a white label, if Dusty did think 'Windmills' was 'bloody awful' then she may have meant to point to 'So Much Love' Track 2 Side 1.

Is that Dusty with Susan Cameron in the 3rd photo down? They look fine together at this time. And so do Dusty and Fred too (I've only seen newer photos of Fred but I think that must be him).

The story behind the Fred Perry Treasures is as follows:

Several years ago, during the heyday of the old "Dustymail", Fred Perry began posting on-line through others. Fred did not have a computer, so he only responded to people via written correspondence (snail mail style). This was approximately a year before his untimely death. There were quite a few "interesting" people on that forum, including several who knew Dusty personally. There were fights and name callings, etc, etc. and some people ended up being "banned" from the site, but who lurked in the background even so. To make a long story short, when Fred began posting through intermediaries, he made it known that he had had many close interactions with Dusty since he had done the lighting for many of her shows. He let people know that he knew her better than some and that he had no agenda when it came to telling his experiences regarding Dusty. He loved her dearly, flaws and all, but he understood that some had other motives for what they said about her. Anyway, he mentioned that he would speak to fans regarding his Dusty experiences off the record and personally via regular mail and we began a correspondence. My letters to Fred were always very respectful of both his knowledge and especially of Dusty. I guess he trusted me, because when he died, his sister, Barb Forsyth, contacted me. Barb had inherited all of Fred's estate, and she wanted to share as much of it with fans as possible, however, she felt Fred would have wanted to make a difference in some way and to honor Dusty. Barb found my correspondence with Fred and contacted me regarding setting up an auction of some Dusty memorabilia. She needed someone who was computer savy as she wanted to do this on-line. Although I was eager to help her, I really didn't have the know how then to do too much except advise. We decided together that Paul Howes would be the person to assist her and she contacted him. In the meantime, Barb sorted and determined which items would be auctioned. Together we decided that it would be more meaningful to Dusty's emmory if the procedes from the auction went to The Royal Marsden rather than a more generic cancer fund. Paul then helped her organize the on-line event and it went from there. As a thank you, Barb sent me several Dusty mementos including a lovely photo of Dusty (circa Memphis era) and a signed Christmas card Dusty had sent to Fred. Of course I was thrilled with these gifts, but the item which most intrigued me was a copy of "Dusty In Memphis" which was found in Fred's collection which came with both the hand-written note Nancy posted and the album which had a plain, white label on which Dusty had scribbled further notes. I desparitly wanted those items, but in the end, Barb decided that the actual handwritten note should go to Paul. She did however, put the actual album with a Xeroxed copy of the note on auction. I was determined to own it and set a rather high ceiling for my bid. Interestingly, the album didn't engender as much bidding as I thought it would - possibly because the original note wasn't included. After some early bidding wars, I was finally able to win the album without going over my ceiling bid - which I was delighted with. Also, I was delighted that the money was going to such a worthy cause.

Barb and I continued to correspond for about another year. Barb's husband became ill and passed away about a year after Fred. Barb spent much time taking care of him and helping him to die gracefully. IThroughout, Barb would e-mail me to just stay in touch and upon his death, I sent my sympathies and a hope that we'd resume contact which had dwindled due to the strain on her time. I had one more e-mail from Barb regarding her settling her husband's estate and then didn't hear from her again. And then out of the blue, I get an e-mail from a Canadian couple (Barb was a resident of Canada at this time) called Pauline & George. It seemed that less than a year after her husband's death, Barb too became ill (in fact, I believe she was ill toward the end of her husband's life). George & Pauline wrote me becuase they had found our correspondence and felt that of all the Dusty fans associated with both Fred and Barb, I had taken the deepest interest in them. George and Pauline were Barb's closest friends and, since she had no heirs, the inheritors of her estate. They told me that they had discovered several boxes of Dusty related material among Barb's effects which they believe originally belonged to Fred. And then they asked if I was interested in any of it! I was overwhelmed, but of course, very interested. I sent Pauline my telephone number and she called me shortly after our initial round of e-mails and described some of the material. There were records, CD's losts of notes and photos and things like signed contracts, newspaper clippings, etc. Over the corse of the next couple of years, Pauline would send me a package of these items every so often after she went through them and cleaned them up. She had little interest in any of the stuff, only wanting to find a "good home" for it. Many of the CD's, etc. I already had, but she sent them to me anyway and several items I sent off to "Sonny DJ" a Dusty fan and New Orleans native who lost everything in Hurricane Katrina. Other items I kept (of course). Eventually four packages of material came to me over the next two years. Most of it was xeroxed copies which I assume Barb had made of notes, records, etc. that Fred had had. I do believe that Paul Howes probably has most of the originals including the originals of Fred's notes which he was planning to eventually organize and publish before he died. Those were the notes that Paul published in the bulletin, along with the original notes Dusty had written regarding "Memphis Plus" which was the reissue of DIM with the four "garbage" tracks Dusty refered to - those tracks are "I Wanna Be A Free Girl", "I Believe In You", "What Do You Do When LOve Dies" and "Haunted". All of these were of course, published at one time or another so they are not really rare anymore, but perhaps were considered so in 1980 or whenever it was that this expanded edition of DIM was issued. As you can see from her comments, Dusty was not happy that these four songs had been included on the reissue. I do feel personally that they mar what I believe to be the perfect pop classic album of all time. On their own, I quite enjoy them - ecept for "I Believe In You" which I've never cared for too much. I love Haunted and I Wanna Be A Free Girl especially. Back to the Fred Perry saga - I've kept all the photos and notes, lots of the 45's which included several by Madeline Bell and several (including the prized autographed "Baby Blue") which had picture sleeves. I've passed on many of the CD's to others who didn't have them. In the last package Pauline sent me, there were several more CD's including a copy of the "Midnight Sounds" single which I offered Nancy for the auction (and which has been won by Scott - congratulations!) and the Complete A and B Sides" which is also an raffle prize. As time goes on, I will organize a list of items so that it's clearer what I have and I'll try (with Nancy's help) to post any other interesting pictures I have. The codicil to this whole experience is that I sent Pauline and George a Christmas card this past holiday and got a reply back from Pauline that her husband George had passed away this year! So, in a relatively short time - less than ten years - we lost Dusty, Fred, Barb, Barb's husband, and George - an errie - and very sad - coincidence!!!


