The original vinyl album didn't have any liner notes, Donella. Here's what's on the cd from 2002:



Like the curate's egg in the famous PUNCH cartoon published in November 1895, Dusty Springfield's album SEE ALL HER FACES, first released in November 1972, is best described as good in parts. It is a curiously schizophrenic production, probably due to the fact that it was culled from sessions which had been recorded between 1969 and 1971 and on both sides of the Atlantic.

The essential lack of cohesion which characterises the album makes complete sense when one considers that there was no over-all producer - between the fourteen tracks on the album as was originally issued and the three supplementary tracks included on this re-release there are four named production teams.Long-time cohort John Franz (this was to be their last collaboration) is co-credited with Dusty as producer of ten tracks; Jerry Wexler, Tom Dowd and Arif Mardin (with whom she'd worked so triumphantly on the seminal DUSTY IN MEMPHIS) take credit for two of the most memorable here: 'Willie and Laura Mae Jones' and 'That Old Sweet Roll (Hi De Ho)'. Jeff Barry has four production credits and one goes to Ellie Greenwich and Mike Rashkow.

Even the title of the album suggests either diversity or confusion. See all her faces? A whole series of metaphysical questions are posed by those few words. Which is her real face? Are any of her faces real? As we have been made painfully aware since Dusty's untimely death, ALL her public faces now appear to have been disguising masks. Even Glen Platt's cover artwork presents an improbably romantic image that is a distant cry from the tomboy so appropriately displayed on that sixties style statement: A GIRL CALLED DUSTY.

SEE ALL HER FACES might also be defined as an album that almost got away - it rates barely a mention between the three biographies which have so far appeared: Lucy O'Brien's "Dusty"; David Evan's "Dusty: Scissors and Paste" and the more recent Penny Valentine and Vicki Wickham opus "Dancing with Demons: The Authorised Biography of Dusty Springfield". The album opens rather slowly, with an up-tempo, somewhat Latinate account of 'Mixed Up Girl' by Jimmy Webb - a songwriter who should have been perfectly suited to exploration by Dusty, though, in fact, she interpreted few of his songs. Things pick up with the second track: Sherrie Payne's 'Crumbs Off The Table'. Dusty gives a sturdy delivery of a somewhat torchy song (the first of several on the album) in which the narrator bemoans her fate as the lover of an individual whose attentions are no more than eponymous "crumbs..." This track and others

remind me of the American film critic and historian, the late Vito Russo, as he told it, found himself at least once a day pausing from what he was doing and murmuring the words "Poor Judy, poor Judy" as he pondered the tragic life and death of Judy Garland. It is perhaps all too easy to formulate strong retrospective opinions, particularly about the dead, but it is equally easy to wonder if the great divas (Josephine Baker, Garland, Edith Piaf, Dusty) selected the songs with which they are identified because they reflected their own lives or because their own lives came to mirror the songs that they sang.

There are many, many songs stretched across the years of Dusty's career into which her own experiences must have become intertwined with the carefully wrought fabric of the songs to imbue them with that depth of emotion which makes so many so memorable but which, at the same time, propel the feeling listener to murmur "Poor Dusty, Poor Dusty"-'Crumbs Off The Table' is but one of half a dozen tracks ('Yesterday When I Was Young', 'What Good Is I Love You?', 'Nothing Is Forever', 'Have A Good Life Baby' and 'What Are You Doing The Rest Of Your Life?') which painfully dissect relationships mired in misunderstanding, crumbling to bitter ashes, doomed to end in the lingering after-taste of stale nicotine, the lees of the wine and too many tears. "The love I knew was always the most destructive kind", Dusty sings in 'Yesterday When I Was Young' and the listener cannot help but accept the essential truth of the lyric.

I Start Counting' - originally released on the flip side of 'Yesterday When I Was Young' when it was released in 1972 - is another of those songs with lyrics which seem particularly pertinent, most notably the line "Sitting by myself in a secret..." And Alan and Marilyn Bergman and Michel Legrand's classy 'What Are You Doing The Rest Of Your Life?' (the theme to Richard Brook's 1969 movie THE HAPPY ENDING which - surprise, surprise focused on sixteen years of unhappy marriage) is a neat reminder that Dusty was a not infrequent venturer into the twin worlds of film and theatre music.

But the curate's egg analogy remains inescapable. The songs enumerated here are the good parts; elsewhere they are longueurs, songs which don't impress in performance; which indicate that even the most consummate of artists can occasionally have a day when she cannot turn froth into cappuccino.

Yet, ultimately, SEE ALL HER FACES, is an album which contains much to enjoy and much to reflect on. And maybe, finally, this diverse collection of songs allows a not-intended glimpse into the sometimes-uncomfortable world of a singer who now remains a legend, a diva up there with the best of them




