To my recollection, I recall reading that Dusty was offered the leading female role in the original West End production of "Oliver," in the mid sixties, replacing Georgia Brown in the role of Nancy. The role included the fabulous ballad "As Long As He Needs Me." (recorded by Shirley Bassey!) Since Dusty's career was skyrocketing at the time and the thought of appearing on stage every night was a bit too much the offer was refused. Later in the late seventies, Dusty was offered the lead role in the production of "I'm Getting My Act Together and Taking It On The Road." It was an Off Broadway musical, with music by Nancy Ford and book and lyrics by Gretchen Cryer. It was produced by Joseph Papp and the New York Shakespeare Festival at The Public Theater, opening on June 14, 1978 and running for 1165 performances. The lead, played by Cryer, is a 39year-old divorceé attempting a comeback as a pop star. Generally considered a feminist vehicle, the plot centers around her displaying new material for her manager without relying on showbiz clichés. The show also enjoyed a 1981 West End production. Dusty was offered the role with full creative control to do whatever she would like with the lyrics or music. Once again, Dusty's confidence and the rigorous performance schedule made her delcine the offer. She speaks about the offer on the Canadian City Lights

program with Brian Linehan in 1981.

Finally, rumor has it that Dusty actively campaigned to play the part of Carlotta in the 1987 West End revival of Stephen Sondheim's "Follies" in which she would have sang that great classic song "I'm Still Here." It would have been a fabulous moment in Dusty history! Alittle tweaking of the lyrics to fit Dusty's own life and career would have made it absolutely fabulous!

I don't think Dusty would have been considered to replace Georgia Brown in the West End production of **Oliver!** as Georgia originated the role of Nancy on 30 June 1960 & left the role a year and a half later: at the start of 1962 Dusty was still with the Springfields & in my perception neither had nor desired a solo persona. There may have been some thought of Dusty coming "on board" later in the show's run which lasted until 1966.

It's been discussed here that Dusty turned down roles in the 1970 off-Broadway production of Weill-Brecht's **Mahagonny** & the West End production of **Cats** which began its run in 1981; in the latter she'd have played Grizabella & performed the show's most famous number *Memory*.

Reportedly Dusty said Carlotta in **Follies** was her ideal role as every night she could sing *I'm Still Here* & go home! Dusty auditioned to take over the role in the West End production in the summer of 1988 but the producers opted to replace Dolores Gray with Eartha Kitt. Perhaps at age 49 Dusty was deemed too young to play a woman who's "been around the block" a few more times than most of the characters including that played by Diana Rigg; at the same time Dolores (age 64) was replaced by Eartha (age 61), Diana - born a year prior to Dusty - was replaced by Millicent Martin who's five years Dusty's senior.

Personally I don't think the numbers in **Gypsy** & Dusty's voice would have done that much for each other. **Mame** would be my musical of choice for her - I think the character would perfectly showcase Dusty's warmth & brio. And she'd own *If He Walked Into My Life*.






