I wanted to start a 'Where Am I Going' thread because for some reason I don't listen to it as often as some of her other 60s albums, and yet when I do play it, I realise that it's fabulous. As this is an album that doesn't seem to be a subject of as much debate and interest as, say, 'Ev'ry thing's Coming Up' or even 'Definitely', I'd be intrigued to know what your thoughts are on this one.

Bring Him Back' (the fastest backing vocals in pop history: get them in quick girls before the music carries on!) is one of many examples of a Dusty song that I've always loved but became truly obsessed with after I saw the live performance on the BBC DVD. At this point, I have to talk about the dancing. Oh, The Dancing! It's possibly the naffest and most unintentionally hilarious choreography I've ever seen, but it's the boys who make it look like this: Dusty just does it so well. And that is my impartial professional opinion. She makes the whole thing appear spontaneous and unchoreographed; for someone who never had any dance training (to my knowledge), this is quite remarkable. Furthermore, if you ask a trained or professional dancer to do a routine that is essentially just footwork, they will naturally move their arms in a certain way. This is exactly what Dusty does. If any footage of her in tap shoes ever turns up I will most probably hyperventilate with excitement.

I love 'Take Me For A Little While' because it features one of her many endearing little vocal trademarks: the way she sometimes deliberately avoids pronouncing her 'r's properly ('and if you don't need me forever...' This is a song that explores the slightly unsavoury but entirely human notion that we saw earlier in 'Some Of Your Lovin': I know you can't commit and that you need to Be A Man and sow your seed, but before you do...While it does this in a more subtle way than the '65 track, it's still one of many Dusty songs that becomes something else altogether when you really listen to the lyrics.

The album features some of Dusty's loveliest and most affecting ballads. 'Welcome Home' is just a brilliantly realised idea of a simple concept for a song: we've both been complete idiots, but never mind, I'm so glad we're back together! The lush and dreamy arrangement (oh, those *strings*) is perfectly complemented by the warmth of her vocal: it's one of those rare songs that actually has a colour. You know when the early evening sunlight shines through the window, and the room is filled with a golden, peachy, fuzzy-round-the-edges kind of light? That's what colour 'Welcome Home' is (early Beach Boys records are like this as well). The way she sustains 'we'll let pride be something we have in ourselves' is just gorgeous: how can she both let go and maintain perfect control at the same time?! 'Chained To A Memory' is another favourite, and I love, love, LOVE 'Broken Blossoms' for the way she uses her Norma Tanega vocals: Dusty's 'unaffected purity' voice is one of the most beautiful sounds on earth.

In true Dusty style, 'Where Am I Going' goes quite some way towards displaying the extraordinary breadth and range of her talent, from soul to musical theatre to ballads to French (Belgian, if you want to be technical love songs to folk. All on one album. Who else could pull off sounding this comfortable in so many different genres? Quite.

I'd love to know what you all think of 'If You Go Away' especially, as my own thoughts on this song have shifted somewhat over the years. I'm keeping quiet for now where this is concerned (relief all round)

That is a fab clip ain't it. It's one of my smile making favourites. I saw it first time last year courtesy of Frans. It's such a skillful pastiche. I wish I could've been in it. It's as good as Stanley Baxter used to be at his best, and Dusty is a true marvel and has obvious talent for comedy and clearly, as we know, went to the movies a lot when she was younger.

I love the album 'Where Am I Going'. It's one of Dusty's best. The quality of the production is superb and must have been cutting edge at the time proving yet again how into the quality Dusty was and how she spent so much time to get things absolutely right. The right musicians, the right equipment, the right everything. This album sounds like it cost a lot of money and time to make. When I first heard it I could hardly believe the sonic quality.

Stand out tracks are 'I Can't Wait To See My Baby's Face', 'Chained To A Memory' and 'Welcome Home'. Totally luxurious and gorgeous. ' Welcome Home' is my favourite. I too love that line 'we'll let pride be something we have in ourselves'. Omigosh! I remember slipping that into the Dustyese thread because I'm hooked on the song. The opening strings which I imagine as cello strings are gorgeous and then the absolutely perfect

singing with that rare swoop from Dusty at the end (Madeline can do these swoops fantastically well but I think this one is by Dusty). I'm in love with this track. It's one of my ultimate favourites. It's perfect. It's also quite modern, adult and mature. It sounds like the two actors are equals. On other songs in the Dusty canon the lyrics are now dated because Dusty is locked into a sort an adoring female role as if she's got nothing else to do in life but sit around being an obsessive love slave. On 'Welcome Home' the situation is much more reasonable and balanced. That's another reason why I love this song. I wonder if Dusty was in love when she recorded this album.

'Bring Him Back' is fab and has made me almost lose control of my car a couple of times because it just makes me want to dance and it's so joyful.

'Sunny' is perfect too.

'Where Am I Going' is a tour de force. This is truly Dusty's song. She loved 'Sweet Charity' and I can imagine that this song meant a lot to her as well as being a good song in any case (not many others of Dusty's stature covered this as far as I know). It's one of her best of all time alongside the others I've mentioned. And, again, it's a fabulous, luxurious production. You can hear everything in it and everything is perfect.

'Take Me For A Little While' is great. It's not as carefully recorded as the great tracks here. I might even like Evie Sands version better as far as the main song goes. But Evie can't beat those lust fuelled wild ad-libs and that swoop. That's Dusty 'hot stuff' Springfield! These ad-libs tell the true story.

I've never liked 'If You Go Away' by anybody. I've always been irritated by it though I've been mesmerised by Jaques Brel's masochistic, almost suicidal version of his own song. Perhaps I think Rod McKuen and Dusty made it a bit too flowery, took too many edges off it. And even Dusty's famous gestures in her famous performance of this song grate with me because they are so rehearsed and take away from the emotional reality. That's not to say this isn't a Dusty master-class because it is but it's also one of the rare occasions I can see and hear the joins and the manipulation. I think this MOR, sentimental treatment of Brel takes too much away from the original song. I don't believe Dusty is heart-broken. What's great about Dusty's performance is that I can see and hear it as just that — a great performance.

Of the extra tracks on the CD I really love 'I've Got A Good Thing' and 'Time After Time' is meltingly gorgeous. I'd have rather had this track on the album proper and taken off the blaring and superfluous 'Come Back To Me'.

Oh and the cover is a bit misleading and the quality of it doesn't reflect the artistry that's on the record. It might well reflect Dusty though. I think she was fairly happy with herself at this time and even if she didn't know exactly where she was going she probably thought the going would be good whatever she did. She was at the peak of her powers on this album. But times were changing as we can see from the lettering on the cover. This excellent album didn't sell very well.

This is indeed a record that sounds, to borrow a phrase from The Great Gatsby, full of money. It's shiny and glossy and expensive. I'm so glad that you love 'Welcome Home' too, because this is a Dusty song that has insinuated itself into my top ten over the last year or two, almost without me noticing it.

'Where Am I Going' is indeed vocally stunning - I can imagine it must have been a killer to perform live, so I'm not surprised she did so only a couple of times. I'm glad that your thoughts on 'Sunny' are favourable as well, because Paul Howes is very scathing about it! (One of the very, very rare examples of me disagreeing with him...)

I was afraid to admit that I'm not a fan of 'If You Go Away', because I know that for a lot of Dusty devotees it's a special song. Before I knew her back catalogue really well, I loved it - I can remember one occasion when I was listening to it on headphones while cycling late at night, and when she did that little spoken ' please don't go away' at the end I had to stop the bike because I thought I was going to melt into the road. But in recent years I've come to the view that it's just a bit of a naff, silly

in recent years I've come to the view that it's just a bit of a naff, silly song, with lyrics that occasionally stray into the ridiculous. It's confirmation of Dusty's talent that she can pull it off, but overall the whole thing is just too mannered and contrived and lacking in that natural spontaneity and truth that characterises so many of her great recordings.

And I'm just not crazy about the cover. Which is a shame as I have a first pressing of this on vinyl in beautiful condition (it looks hardly played). The famous hat photo just does not match the beauty and class and sophistication of what is contained within.

It's very interesting that you say you like 'Where Am I Going' more than 'Ev'rything's Coming Up'. A surprising and bold declaration! I'm afraid I have to disagree though - ECUD is a landmark album, both in terms of Dusty's career and in terms of sixties pop music: as Simon Bell said somewhere (I think on his Amazon list!) it's Dusty taking on the American girls at their own game and winning. As well as all those stomping, roof-lifting, floorshaking soul numbers (Won't Be Long, I Can't Hear You, Packin' Up, If It Don't Work Out), the wonderfully bonkers Doodlin' and the quite devastating I've Been Wrong Before, you've also got all those luscious ballads (I Had A Talk With My Man, That's How Heartaches Are Made and the song that leaves me in a crumpled heap: Who Can I Turn To. Ohhhhh...)






I've always been impressed by the high quality of the album. It sounds lush and well mixed almost without exception. Curiously though, this was the hardest album for me to find on LP, and next to hardest to find on CD. It's her 3rd lowest selling album that charted.

Now, it's been said that this sounds more like a compilation or covers album than a proper studio album. I can see that, but to me, it doesn't quite sound like that, because most of the songs aren't covers to me...Miss Dusty's are the first versions of these songs I've heard. But I think the fact that at the time, as Carole R pointed out, a lot of these songs WERE seen as covers probably did contribute a lot to the album not seeing higher than #40 in the charts. As for the songs themselves...

The opening number 'Bring Him Back' is amongst my Dusty favorites. It's totally energetic and fun, and just sizzles. The video of Miss Dusty performing this on her TV show with the two male dancers is just classic. LOVE. IT.

The next two, 'Don't Let Me Lose This Dream' and 'I Just Can't Wait Until I See My Baby's Face' are songs I've long associated with Aretha Franklin. However, I prefer Miss Dusty's versions as they contain an element of restraint. God bless her, but restraint is not often found in Ms. Franklin's recordings of any song. Miss Dusty knows just when to belt out a chorus, and when to hold back. It's one of her vocal/musical gifts.

'Take Me for A Little While' is a song that has had to grow on me, but has it EVER grown on me. I love it now. It's got a continuous rhythm throughout, even as it changes keys, and it ends up being so exhilarating. It's like a Classy bomb going off, that high note she hits at the end!

I'll count myself in the nonplussed camp regarding 'Sunny' I don't love it, I certainly don't hate it. But it's not a song I listen to often. I've heard Bobby Hebb's version, but don't really care for it. I do however, like the arrangement of his version better. I agree with Paul Howes; Miss Dusty's voice could handle anything, including Big Band style arrangements, but it was far more suited to arrangements that showcased her voice, rather than her singing along with the arrangement, if that makes sense.

A perfect example? 'Chained to a Memory' and 'Welcome Home'. Both are lush, full arrangements that show off the versatility and varied textures of Miss Dusty's voice. Both are simply gorgeous songs.

'They Long to Be Close to You' is almost always associated with the Carpenters. I think Karen Carpenter had a beautiful voice, but I prefer the less mellow version done by Miss Dusty (which was actually recorded several years before the Carpenters'). It's got more conviction to it, and while Karen sings it beautifully, Miss Dusty takes it to a higher level.

'Come Back to Me' belongs in the same category as 'Sunny". Miss Dusty sings it wonderfully, but I don't care for it much beyond the album. It's got some amusing lyrics, but isn't suited to the general style of the album.

I'm with those who have posted so far regarding 'If You Go Away'. It's certainly not a bad song, and again, Miss Dusty sings it beautifully, but it's one of the few songs she sings that is lacking for the fullness of emotion I'd come to expect from her. It does seem a little too calculated. It also seems a bit too long, to me.

'Broken Blossoms' is a beautiful song, and I love the Norma Tanega-iness in the delivery of every line. It allows the lyrics to really shine through, and Tom truly did come up with an affecting song. It's simple, yet powerful.

'Where Am I Going?' is a complete tour-de-force. The song never lets up. I appreciate it more for how amazing and flawless Miss Dusty's vocals are from beginning to end, not to mention the power and range she displays, but that's precisely why I don't listen to it much. It's very intense, vocally, and that makes it difficult for consistent repeated listenings.

All in all, it's a classy album, to be sure, and has a lot of good moments. It seems to lack some variety that ECUD had, for instance, or that 'Dusty... Definitely' came up with, and perhaps that's why it didn't sell well. The performances are almost TOO good. I hope that makes sense.

I ordered a CD copy from Amazon Marketplace about three years ago and when it arrived it was a CD-R copy - a professionally produced copy, but a copy nonetheless, with different artwork and no sleeve notes! I like the fact that you commented on Dusty's restraint and how this is often much more effective than Aretha's more belting style. Aretha is without question prodigiously technically gifted but I much prefer Dusty for her much more varied use of dynamics and different textures.

I'm in complete agreement with you that 'Chained To A Memory' and 'Welcome Home' are the highlights on this album. 'Welcome Home' in particular is one of Dusty's finest recordings. 'Lush' is just the right word for both these heavenly songs.

'Broken Blossoms' is a masterpiece. I'm just madly in love with Dusty's Norma Tanega voice. And the title track is just a superb example of what The Voice could do with the brakes off; it's astonishing, in fact, that this and 'Broken Blossoms' are sung by the same person. Again, I'm just stunned by the seemingly limitless range and breadth of her capabilities.

So thank you for you marvellous thoughts, Taylor, and be more careful about accidentally closing windows in future!


