I've just come across an item of Dusty-related minutia that I suspect may have escaped the notice of most of my board buds: as evidenced by the above South African hit parade dated 8 July 1966 YDHTSYLM was a Top 20 hit in South Africa - but not for Dusty! While of course two of Dusty's US hits had parallel charting in the UK for other acts the situation of a version of YDHTSYLM being cut for the South African market I'd consider to be a unique example of a "local cover" being made of one of Dusty's hits.


The 8 July hit parade in itself illustrates that the South African charts of the 60s were overall accommodating to UK artists: in fact the Petula Clark song on the above survey is one of three Top Ten hits Petula scored on the South African charts in addition to her hits which were global releases, & also Petula's 1961 international hit *Sailor* hit the South African Top Ten in a 1968 local re-release.

The implication I'd draw is that due to her sticking up for her principles & being deported Dusty was persona non grata on the South African airwaves. While logically Dusty must have attracted some attention in South Africa for her to have made her portentous 1964 junket she's conspicuous by her

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absence from the South African charts available online which date from the summer of 1965 - at least until 1988 when What Have I Done to Deserve This reached #16.

Oh yes - here's Pamela Dean singing her #15 South African hit You Don't Have to Say You Love Me:



IMHO while Ms Dean has a decent voice she doesn't even try - altho there'd probably be little point in replicating the original's emotion: rather she sounds as if she's reading the lyrics of cue cards she's seeing for the first time. And what's with "Let me go with just a memory"? But as I say I suspect that had Pamela or some other local artist not covered YDHTSYLM for the South African market the song simply wouldn't have been a hit there & at least the packaging of Pamela's version acknowledges the prowess of Dusty's original.
